A Note from the President...

April is always an exciting month, when we anticipate the coming of longer days, warmer evenings and, soon, summertime! April is also a time to reflect upon our earnings and economic value as women, and the issue of Equal Pay.

On the evening of April 14, be sure to attend our multibranch event at CLU, highlighting the successful work of CA Senator Hannah-Beth Jackson in sponsoring the new CA Fair Pay Act. Senator Jackson will be our special guest speaker and will share her insights on this new legislation and how it affects all of us in this state. She will also tell us about the next steps needed to minimize the inequity in pay for men and women.

Governor Jerry Brown signed the Fair Pay Act into law last October, expanding a 1963 federal regulation prohibiting companies from paying men and women differently for equal work. For example, women working as "maids" in hotels were often paid much less than men doing similar work in the same hotel, but as "custodians." The "similar work" provision is important, legal experts say, because the "equal work" rule was very narrow, allowing employers to use any differences in job responsibilities as a rationale for pay disparities.

"Most differences in pay scales between men and women aren't because they're in the same job, but because they're in female- or male-dominated job categories," said Martha West, professor of law at the UC Davis, School of Law. So, in the example of "maids vs custodians" mentioned above, these two job categories were historically and traditionally either "female" or "male" thus creating pay inequities based upon job title rather than on actual work performed.

Helping women advance not only in their salary but also in leadership roles within the structure of the company is good not just for women and their families—it's good for their companies, as well. A recent study led by the National Association of Female Executives showed companies with 30 percent women leaders have a 15 percent higher profitability rate than companies with no female leaders and the more women there are at the top, the better the companies do!

So, as April "springs" upon us, we all need to reflect on the gains we have made in California with our new Fair Pay Act and seek those opportunities to improve our leadership roles in all aspects of both our work day and private lives! See you on Thursday, April 14 at CLU.

AAUW Commemorative Oak to be Planted April 28



Pay Equity: Why has There Been Such Little Progress?

This month, as AAUW looks forward to promoting the importance of equal pay for women, there is disturbing new research finding that the pay gap between men and women is a deeply held cultural structure. The evidence suggests that "Work done by women simply isn't valued as highly" as that done by men. This phenomenon exists "even though women are better educated than men, have nearly as much work experience and often pursue high-paying careers."

A study at Cornell University found that when women enter fields that were previously dominated by men, pay declines. Hourly wages were reduced significantly in fields as varied as a ticket agent, parks/recreation staff, a designer and biologist when the job went from predominately male to female. When the job is in the same field, there continues to be a pay gap. "Female physicians earn 71% of what male physicians earn and lawyers earn 82%."

While raising the minimum wage and legislating equal pay are policies being pursued to narrow the gap, there is more work to be done on a variety of fronts.

Museums and Gardens Group Heads to Newhall in April

The 1925 silent film "Tumbleweeds," about the Oklahoma land rush started in 1889, was the last of William S. Hart's



69 pictures. Yet this largely-forgotten star from the early days of motion picture history left an extraordinary legacy, one that few Hollywood celebrities of any era could match: the William S. Hart Park and Museum, a gift to the public that had made him one of the top-grossing movie actors in the world from 1914 to the mid-1920s.

This 166-acre park consists of eight early-20th-century buildings on what was once a working ranch; a collection of farm animals; a herd of bison; a picnic area; and four miles of hiking trails. And atop a hill affording views of the surrounding Santa Clarita Valley is the museum, a 22-room Spanish Colonial Revival mansion that Mr. Hart called home for the last 19 years of his life.

The Hart mansion is that rare thing in the museum world: the home of a famous person that has become a historic house

museum with no intervening owners. Also, most of the original contents are intact: not just the furnishings, but intimate objects associated with the man himself.

On Wednesday, April 27, we will depart at 10:00 AM from the Barnes and Noble in Westlake and return prior to 4:00 PM. We will plan to have a fun, pot luck picnic lunch on the beautiful grounds. Your cost is your share of the gasoline costs to your driver, and your contribution to the picnic lunch. The museum is free.


