


Oak Twig Editors Needed for 2016-2017!

Education Bill Signed Into Law



The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) is the new federal education bill recently passed into law. It replaces No Child Left Behind (NCLB) known for inadequate funding, applying sanctions on schools that did not help with school improvement and narrowing the curriculum and instruction while overemphasizing testing.

ESSA will take effect in the 2017-18 school year allowing for a period of transition. Overall, ESSA addresses testing and accountability, teacher evaluation, and grants and fiscal accountability. States have increased flexibility and responsibility for developing accountability systems. And the bill requires the involvement of stakeholders in programs that improve student safety, health, well-being and academic achievement.

The funding for these policies will be determined by the House Appropriations Committee and the Senate Finance Committee.


