



Welcome, Betty, to the world of the retired, where you can watch the rain from the window of your house rather than the window of your car.



Killing Us Softly 4

Thursday, March 5 • 7:00 PM Richter Hall, California Lutheran University

Join AAUW and CLU's Gender Studies Program for the screening of *Killing Us Softly 4*, the latest in Jean Kilbourne's award-winning series, which takes a fresh look at American advertising and how women are portrayed. It appears that the more things have changed, the more they've stayed the same.

This film challenges another generation to take advertising seriously and to think critically about its relationship to sexism, eating disorders, gender violence and contemporary politics. Kilbourne uses over 160 print ads and commercials to critique advertising's portrayal of women and invites the audience to look at familiar images in a new way: one that will move and

empower viewers to take action. A panel discussion will follow the screening of the film.

"Jobs of the Future" – Our partnership with California Lutheran University on February 10, 2015 was attended by over 100 middle school, high school, and college students, their parents, AAUW Thousand Oaks members, and members of the community.

Nathalie Gosset, EE, MS, MBA Senior Director, Marketing and Technology Innovation Evaluation, Alfred E. Mann Institute for Biomedical Engineering, USC, and AAUW Thousand Oaks Member, showed the audience what the jobs of the future are, what jobs are disappearing and what new jobs are being created. National Women's History Project and AAUW Thousand Oaks Celebrate Milestones

The idea of a Women's History Week came from five California women* of Santa Rosa, California, who, encouraged by the success of their first two Women's History weeks, took the idea to the Women's History Institute in the summer of 1979. The Institute passed a resolution to create a National Women's History Week and lobbied extensively with state and national officials. In 1980, President Jimmy Carter issued a Presidential Message calling on the American people to remember the extraordinary accomplishments of women during the week of March 2-8, 1980. The NWHP received a grant to establish a teacher training resource that would help teachers incorporate women's history into all grades and subjects. In 1987, Congress expanded the week into the National Women's History Month. Today, after 35 years, Women's History Month is celebrated in hundreds of schools and worksites, from kindergarten classes to retirement communities in every state.

AAUW Thousand Oaks Branch published its first book *Profiles of Women Past and Present* in 1995, which included scripts about fifteen outstanding women. Today, twenty years later, the Branch has close to 100 scripts written about notable women for use in classrooms and communities throughout the United States and around the world. Thanks to the vision and talent of our Branch members, we have added greatly to the educational resources available about women's achievements.

On March 9, 2015, at the Thousand Oaks Library, the Branch will present its 2015 Women's History Program, featuring scripts written by Branch members about the lives of Maya Angelou, Jane Goodall, Wilma Mankiller, Yoshiko Uchida and Malala Yousafzai. Bring your friends to this outstanding program, which begins at 6:00 PM.

We are excited to have a panel of authors from the Central Coast Chapter of Sisters in Crime speak to us about what's happening in the publishing world. Among them they have written an extensive collection of mystery and suspense novels and have dealt with the changes. Come hear what the writers have to say.

The authors on our panel will be:

- **Sue McGinty** -- author of the Bella Kowalski mystery series taking place in the unique and funky towns on the Pacific beach. She will speak on the "Create Space Experience."
- Tony Piazza -- mystery writer, film historian, and veteran storyteller. Also an actor and stand-in for movies and television, he has appeared in the films *Magnum Force*, *Towering Inferno*, and others. Tony will speak on "Indie Publishing for the E-book Generation."
- Susan Tuttle -- author of suspense novels, and winner of the indie B.R.A.G. Medallion. Her work is available in both print and digital form. She conducts weekly "Write it Right" writing group classes. She is past president of SLO NightWriters and the Central Coast Chapter of Sisters in Crime. Susan will speak on "E-book Formatting and How to Self-edit Your Work for Publication."
- Barbara Hodges -- author or co-author of nine novels and the fantasy series *Daradawn*. She also hosts a monthly program "No Limits," on Blog Talk Radio, where she talks with those involved in the field of writing. Barbara will speak about "The Importance of Social Media and the Promotion in the E-age."
