














What's on the Horizon for STEM Careers?

The purpose is to encourage these young minds to stay engaged in their math and science education so they can be prepared to pursue STEM careers. AAUW promotes this purpose by offering a Saturday morning set of

workshops providing hands-on experiences and first - hand access to a variety of female role models working in STEM fields.

T.O. Branch Endowment Recipient Announced

AAUW Thousand Oaks has three endowments established by its members over the 50 years that the Branch has existed. The largest endowment is the Thousand Oaks 30th Anniversary American Fellowship, which is given yearly to a graduate student completing her thesis for a Ph.D



The recipient of this endowment for 2015-16 is PARISA MANSOURIFARD. Parisa is a student at the University of Southern California completing an advanced degree in Electrical Engineering. She also has a master's degree in electrical

engineering and computer science.

Parisa's research interests include decision making, stochastic control and optimization and the intersection of optimization and learning theory. The title of her thesis is *Newsvendor Problems in Networks:*Optimization under Resource / Demand Uncertainty. In addition to the Thousand Oaks endowment, Parisa's fellowship is supported by three other AAUW endowments.

Museums and Gardens Group to View Art in Pasadena

Welcome back to another wonderful year for our Museums and Gardens group! For the month of October, we will carpool to the Norton Simon Museum in Pasadena, which several members have suggested as a trip location. There are many quality art exhibits there this fall, which should be quite interesting.



The accidental discovery of Prussian blue in an alchemist's laboratory around 1704 helped to open up new possibilities for artistic expression at the dawn of the Enlightenment. A Revolution of the Palette explores the use of this pigment, followed by the introduction of cobalt blue


and synthetic ultramarine, by French artists from the Rococo period to the threshold of Impressionism.

We will also view the special exhibit of drawings by the French master, Jean-Honoré Fragonard, who ascended to

the rank of one of the 18th century's most popular painters. Fragonard experienced The Grand Tour, made from 1759 to 1761, which inspired him to chronicle this experience for an audience that shared his fascination with the Italy. The black chalk drawings



Fragonard produced for his Grand Tour sponsor became immensely popular publications and served as barometers of taste for the arts.

The motion to support the 2050 SOAR Initiatives Renewal Campaign was unanimously passed at the Fall Membership Breakfast on Saturday, September 19th (read the full resolution below). The SOAR Initiatives to SAVE OPEN SPACE AND AGRICULTURAL RESOURCES for the County of Ventura and the City of Thousand Oaks ensures that land zoned for agricultural use and open space can only be converted to more intensive development uses with voter approval. Branch members will be encouraged to collect signatures for the ballot initiatives and work in coalition with other groups to achieve the passage of the SOAR initiatives.

SUBJECT: The 2050 SOAR Initiatives Renewal Campaign

RESOLUTION: Be it Resolved that AAUW Thousand Oaks supports the renewal of the 2050 SOAR Initiatives to SAVE OPEN SPACE AND AGRICULTURAL RESOURCES for the County of Ventura and for the City of Thousand Oaks to ensure that land zoned for agricultural use and open space can only be converted to more intensive development uses with voter approval.

WHEREAS, "AAUW promotes the economic, social, and physical well-being of all persons and essential to that well-being is a clean and healthful environment." (AAUW Public Policy Program, 2015-2017) And..

WHEREAS, AAUW has a long tradition of advocating for environmental issues including a scholarship to Rachel Carson in 1945 with which she wrote *Silent Spring*. And..

WHEREAS, local advocacy on environmental issues has been a hallmark of the fifty year history of AAUW Thousand Oaks and continues today with our support for responsible land use. And..

WHEREAS, with the passage of the original SOAR initiatives between 1995 and 2001 that received support from a majority of voters in the County of Ventura and in each of eight municipalities in the County, we have reaped the benefits of SOAR by maintaining buffers between our cities, minimizing congestion, conserving water, furthering our economic growth and protecting natural spaces and agricultural land. And..

WHEREAS, renewal of the SOAR initiatives requires collection of tens of thousands of registered voter signatures followed by a positive vote of the electorate. And..

WHEREAS, the Branch strongly supports the involvement of its members in the participatory governance of the community

Therefore, be it RESOLVED,


That AAUW Thousand Oaks fully endorses the renewal of the 2050 SOAR initiatives with the following actions:



Please Help Make American Women Visible 600,000 People Asked for a Woman on the \$20 - What We Got Was A Major Downgrade

Dear Friend,

Earlier this year, our campaign to get a woman on paper money went viral. Hundreds of thousands of people like you took to the idea, and voted to choose Harriet Tubman to replace Andrew Jackson on the \$20 bill.

Then, in June, the Treasury Department announced that it would be putting a woman on the \$10 bill - or rather, that a woman would share the \$10 bill with Alexander Hamilton. This is not what hundreds of thousands of people asked for. Please add your name to the petition asking the White House and the Treasury to properly respond to the Women on 20s petition and put a woman's portrait on the \$20 bill!

John Oliver, in his characteristically hilarious and blunt way, perfectly summarized why this move by the Treasury department felt like such a blow to us: "This is basically the perfect embodiment of the women's rights movement. Women ask for something they've earned, a bunch of men get together and talk about it, and then they give the woman half and ask her to share it."

Indeed, it is almost funny. But there's another, much more serious reason why we believe the \$20 bill - the bill most commonly dispensed by every ATM - needs to be changed. It currently features the face of our seventh president Andrew Jackson, known more today for his disastrous mistreatment of native Americans and active role in slave trading than for any other aspect of his legacy. Ironically, Jackson is also known for his hatred of paper money! There is nothing that makes more sense than booting Andrew Jackson from the \$20 bill and replacing him with the inspirational and powerful former slave and freedom fighter Harriet Tubman.

This is a time when we can't just sit back and give up. We find it significant that the proposal of a woman for a high-volume, high-visibility note was met, quite literally, with a devaluation to a bill produced in one-quarter the numbers of the \$20.

2020 is the 100th Anniversary of the triumph of the 72-year campaign that won women in the United States the right to vote. Women on the \$20 will be a constant reminder of this historic, non-violent campaign for women's right to participate in our democracy.

It's time American currency values women as much as it values men. Please sign the petition telling President Obama and the Treasury Department that women deserve more than the \$10 bill.


